## OUTDOOR EDUCATION

As you know, we were unable to visit High Borrans earlier this year due to Covid restrictions and we have recently heard that East Barnby is unable to host the residential we had planned for Year 3 & 4 pupils at the end of this term. We really value outdoor education and are working on alternative, local plans for this type of learning, with the aim being to make some provision for pupils in both Key Stage 1 & 2. We feel this will make an exciting addition to our work at school next half-term and will make a great reward for pupils that are working hard. We expect that the plans should be finalised in the next week or two and we will be in touch again soon when we can share these in full. Please note that all sessions will be fully funded by school, utilising the sport premium grant.

## ELM TREES AT REETH SCHOOL

Sadly, it seems that the two Elm trees at the front of Reeth School have suffered significantly from the last two very dry spring seasons. The trees are currently showing no signs of life yet this year and some of the lower limb branches have already died. In the coming weeks these branches will be removed, in line with specialist advice. If the remaining parts of the trees do not show any signs of recovery by late summer, then we will engage with a tree specialist to have them removed.

## OPPORTUNITIES TO CONTRIBUTE TO LOCAL COMMUNITY INITIATIVES

We have been invited to take part in 2 local art and design projects. Class teachers have explained these to pupils today and an outline of the information which has been shared is included for your information below.

### Project 1: Design a logo for a local environmental group



The Richmondshire Climate Action Partnership is a new group that has recently been established in the area. Its collective aim is to develop a road map for the Richmondshire district to achieve net-zero carbon and leave a sustainable future for generations to come. The partnership is keen to take account of the voices of young people and has invited pupils to take part in a logo competition.

Pupils are invited to design a logo that '*expresses their vision for effective action against climate change*'. This can be representative of the action(s) that they think should be taken, the outcome that they would wish to see, or simply the importance of a healthy planet. Pupils can make their logo on a computer, use paint or do a drawing. If your child would like to submit a logo design, they need to hand it in to their class teacher or e-mail it to the school office by this coming Tuesday, 18<sup>th</sup> May.

### Project 2: Develop artwork for a local bus company



The Upper Dales Community Partnership runs public and school bus services under the name of The Little White Bus. These services travel over 500,000 miles each year in the local area. The partnership has launched a competition which invites children in the local area to design artwork, inspired by the phrase '*this is what the Yorkshire Dales means to me*', to apply to their newly purchased vehicles. There will be a different design for each vehicle and prizes for winning designs! Artwork from pupils needs to be on A4

paper in portrait orientation and accompanied by a few written sentences explaining their design and how it represents the Yorkshire Dales. If your child would like to submit a design, they need to hand their work into their class teacher by 30<sup>th</sup> June.

## STORY OF SCHOOLS EXHIBITION



An exhibition featuring a spectacular 4.5 meter-wide photo mosaic and telling the story of schools in the Upper Dales through interpretation boards, photographs, film and oral history accounts is being launched on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> May and will run until 18<sup>th</sup> July at [The Dales Countryside Museum, Hawes](#). The launch coincides with the re-opening of the museum, with covid-control measures in place, after a six month period of closure. Advance booking is required. The exhibition marks the culmination of a project run by [The NASH](#) in partnership with the museum, and funded by [The National Lottery Heritage Fund](#) and the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's [Sustainable Development Fund](#).
