

## Reeth and Gunnerside Schools – School Sport Grant

### September 2014 – July 2015

For the period September 2014 to July 2015 our schools received a total of £11,670 as the school sport grant.

#### **Sporting opportunities offered by the school were:**

Cluster Events: KS1 multi-skills, Haka/STOMP day, Football matches, Cross-country competition, Sportshall athletics, Rugby Festival, Rounders.

#### Sporting activities provided by specialist coaches at our schools:

- Rugby sessions (KS2)
- Gymnastics and dance (KS1 and KS2)
- Tennis (EYFS and KS1)

#### Lunchtime sporting activities and after-school sports:

- Key Stage 2 - Cross-county, Football, Hockey, Cheerleading, Stick games, Table Tennis, Netball and Basketball, Rounders, Athletics.
- Key Stage 1 – Dance, Multi-skills, Athletics, Cricket, Ball skills and Team games.

Most of these sessions were provided by a freelance PE teacher who visits each week. All the sessions are funded by the school and were popular with the children.

#### Off-site sporting opportunities:

- Swimming and aqua-splash sessions (KS1 and KS2).
- Adventure activity sessions at Marrick Priory for KS2 children, covering low and high ropes, abseiling, problem solving, orienteering, climbing, shelter building and archery. Do take a look at the video on our blog which shows the children enjoying these activities.

#### **Specialist equipment and training invested in by the schools:**

Year 6 pupils took part successfully in Bikeability training. Towards the end of the year the school invested in its own mountain bike equipment, along with mountain bike leader training for existing school staff, and plans to introduce after-school mountain biking sessions for KS2 pupils in 2015/16.

#### **Impact of Sport Premium:**

##### Successes

- Specialist teachers delivered 50% of school sport.
- Lunch time and after school sport offered 4 times per week, all year.
- Pupils are coached in preparation for cluster events.
- Staff have benefitted from in house CPD.
- Pupils have experienced competitive sport with other schools, competing in a broad range of events.
- KS2 pupils found the outdoor education activities at Marrick Priory very worthwhile. Pupils benefitted from increased self esteem, teamwork skills, motivation for

learning and were introduced to new sports, beyond the scope of those available at school.
