They each led a section of the route and are now increasingly able to navigate independently. For some of the group, this was the third of the Yorkshire Three Peaks – a great achievement!



GUNNERSIDE GILL MINE WALK

Y5 & 6 pupils enjoyed a great day exploring Gunnerside Gill as part of their study of former lead mining in the local area. We walked through the dressing floors of Sir Francis Level, learning about the different methods used to process the lead ore and the increasing use of technology to drive the levels and pump water from the mines. We ventured further to Bunton Level and then on to the smelt mill and and peat store at Blakethwaite. We returned on the western side of the valley and this gave a great view of the Gorton, Friarfold and Bunton hushes.

'Today was really fun, my favourite part was visiting the entrance to Sir Francis Level. The level is one mile long and took 13 years to build.' Alexa

'I liked thinking about what it was like to be a child lead miner and how hard life would have been.' We're pleased to let you know that our breakfast and wraparound offer, based at Reeth, will continue from September. We've adjusted the days that the service is available to meet parent requirements as best we can.

Breakfast: Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 7:45am After school: Tuesdays and Thursdays until 5:45pm

Costs remain the same for the year ahead: £5 for breakfast and £10 for after school sessions.

The service has included nursery age pupils and will continue to do so for the year ahead. Please note that as part of a review of our offer, a year from now in September 2026, provision will be for pupils in reception through to Y6.
